The Vice Chairman, Chief Executive Officer, Cross River State Planning Commission, Pastor Dr. Bong Duke has charged Civil Servants in the State not to be desperate to become rich overnight, but should learn to grow by their years in the service and not to

blow in wealth.


She admitted that Mr Ettah provided direction, administrative clarity, and professional

Cross River: Best Congress Ever Conducted, Congress Committee Chair Declares Ikom Claim Unfounded

The Chairman of the State Congress Committee, Mr. Samuel Yarnap, has declared the just-concluded ward and local government congresses in Cross River State as the most peaceful and best

conducted exercise in the country, emphatically dismissing claims that the process did not hold in Ikom Local Government Area.

Addressing journalists in Calabar at the close of the exercise

conducted between February 18 and 21, Yarnap described the congress as a model of transparency, discipline and unity. "Since we arrived on the 17th and monitored the ward congress on the 18th through



to the local government congress, what we have witnessed," he said, "might be the best congress

ever conducted in the entire country." He stressed that the exercise was devoid of rancour, violence or parallel

structures, noting that party members across the 18 local government areas conducted themselves with loyalty and decorum. "It has been very peaceful. The party members have shown uncommon coordination and



support. We are impressed, and I am very sure the National Chairman is equally proud," Yarnap stated, revealing that real-time updates and video evidence were forwarded to the national leadership.

According to him, the response from Abuja was both reassuring and celebratory. "He responded to us that he is proud and happy that Cross River State did not disappoint

at all," Yarnap disclosed, adding that the atmosphere of peace in the state under Governor Senator Bassey Edet Otu significantly contributed to the success of the exercise. "We have a peaceful, God-fearing governor, and the people love him. That spirit was evident everywhere."

Governor Otu, who monitored the proceedings, described the congress as smooth

and purposeful. "The exercise has been very smooth and peaceful," he affirmed. "There were no hitches or problems anywhere at all." He further emphasized that the unity displayed by party faithful reflected a shared commitment to national political objectives. "You can see that all our party members are peaceful. The officials who witnessed it are very satisfied with the exercise."

Against this backdrop of overwhelming commendation, claims by the Chairman of Ikom Local Government Area, Mrs. Mercy Nsor, alleging that the congress did not hold in Ikom, were strongly deprecated and categorically dismissed by party officials and members of the monitoring committee.

Multiple party stakeholders and accredited delegates from Ikom confirmed that the congress was duly conducted in line with approved guidelines. Attendance registers were completed, officials were present, and voting processes were carried out

peacefully. "The congress held in Ikom like every other local government," a senior party source asserted. "To suggest otherwise is to disregard documented facts and the testimony of those who participated."

Yarnap himself reaffirmed the comprehensiveness of the oversight process. "We went round before concluding. What we have seen is transparency and order," he said firmly. "Cross River State has conducted the best congress. It was peaceful, coordinated and credible."

Party leaders maintained that the claim that the congress did not hold in Ikom does not reflect the

general consensus across the state, where observers and participants alike have hailed the exercise as free, fair and transparent. They described the allegation as isolated and inconsistent with verifiable evidence on ground. As Mr. Samuel Yarnap succinctly put it, "This is the best congress ever".

Bansara Community Set for Agric Boost as SPIN Project Takes Off

Bansara Rice Set for Agro Boost with Flood Control and Irrigation Farming starting soon

Bansara Community, located within the Ogoja rice belt of Cross River State, is poised for a major agricultural transformation through flood control and irrigation farming under the

Sustainable Power and Irrigation for Nigeria (SPIN) Project.

This development follows the successful conclusion of a technical verification visit by the Federal Project Management Unit

(FPMU) of the SPIN Project to Cross River State.

The federal delegation, led by the Head of Technical Unit on Irrigation and Drainage, Engr. Mrs. Hauwa Sadique, conducted a



comprehensive assessment of the proposed site to ascertain its technical feasibility and provide implementation recommendations.

At the project location, the State Project Coordinator, Engr. Mrs. Justina Ulafor, guided the delegation across

the expansive farmland spanning approximately 630 hectares. The site is naturally supported by River Ayar, which is expected to serve as a sustainable water source for the planned irrigation infrastructure, enabling year-round farming activities.

The State Project Engineer, Engr. Dr.

Ndifon Agbiji, presented detailed engineering designs outlining the proposed layout and key infrastructure components. The presentation facilitated in-depth technical discussions on feasibility, scope, and implementation requirements.



Beyond the physical site inspection, the delegation engaged extensively with community stakeholders, including the Council of Chiefs, youth and women leaders, and the Water Users Association (WUA),

which was constituted in accordance with project guidelines. The interactions highlighted the community's preparedness and institutional structures necessary to support effective implementation and long-term management of the

irrigation scheme.

Speaking on behalf of the community, Elder Simon Ebi expressed appreciation to both the Federal and State Governments for selecting Bansara as a beneficiary of the project. He noted that as a predominantly rice-producing community, irrigation-enabled all-season farming would significantly increase yields and improve household incomes.

The Youth Leader, Mr. Anthony Awum, pledged the full cooperation of the youths, assuring the team of adequate security and a conducive working environment for personnel deployed to the



of addressing challenges such as flooding and drought, Mrs. Mogbor, however, raised concerns regarding limited market access for rice, input supply constraints, and inadequate access to finance. Building a Future-Ready Institute: Dandaura Mobilises Chapters to upscale Reforms

In a clear signal that the Nigerian Institute of Public Relations (NIPR) is entering a new phase of institutional reform, the Acting President, Prof. Emmanuel Samu Dandaura, has charged Chapter Public Relations Officers (PROs) and Assistant Secretaries to embrace a more strategic and transformative role in the Institute's evolving administrative architecture.

Addressing officers from state chapters during a virtual

engagement on Wednesday, Prof. Dandaura framed their responsibilities not as routine functions but as levers of institutional renewal.

He anchored his remarks on Bye-Law No. 2 of 1992, as amended in 2024, describing the amendment as a deliberate recalibration designed to align chapter operations with the Institute's national reform agenda.

"The bye-law was not amended for formality," he stressed. "It was refined to

strengthen efficiency, accountability and synergy between the chapters and the national body."

He described Chapter PROs as more than communicators, they are custodians of reputation and architects of perception at the grassroots. Entrusted with designing and executing communication strategies, managing stakeholder relations, engaging the media and shaping public confidence, they

stand at the frontline of projecting the Institute's values and credibility.

Prof. Dandaura urged chapters to maximise digital platforms as instruments of integration rather than isolated publicity channels. Cross-posting activities, learning from sister chapters and amplifying local initiatives nationally, he said, would deepen professional cohesion and institutional identity.

The reform thrust, however, extends beyond communication. The Acting President highlighted the strategic redesignation of

the Assistant Secretary as the Officer in Charge of ICT at chapter level, a move he described as both symbolic and structural.


"This is a defining shift," he noted. "It ensures that every chapter becomes a contributor to the Institute's digital ecosystem, from membership processing to content development and data management."

Tinubu Signs Executive Order To Protect Nigeria's Oil & Gas Revenue



President Bola Tinubu has taken a major step to safeguard and enhance Nigeria's oil and gas revenues by signing an Executive Order aimed at stopping wasteful spending, eliminating overlapping

structures in the sector, and ensuring that resources are properly redirected for the benefit of Nigerians.

Under the new order, NNPC Limited will no longer collect the 30% Frontier Exploration Fund nor the 30%

management fee on profit oil and profit gas. Previously, these deductions meant that a significant portion of the Federation's oil revenue was being held back, despite existing funds being sufficient to cover NNPC's operational

needs. From now on, all payments — including royalties, taxes, profit oil, profit gas, and even gas flare penalties — will go directly to the Federation Account, ensuring that federal, state, and local governments receive their rightful share.

The Executive Order addresses concerns over the PIA's structure, which had created multiple overlapping deductions and allowed NNPC to influence costs while functioning as a commercial entity. By removing duplicative fees and funds, the government aims to increase transparency, reduce leakages, and reposition

NNPC strictly as a commercial operator.

President Tinubu emphasized that the reforms are urgently needed to support national budgeting, debt sustainability, economic stability, and social development, particularly in areas like security, education, healthcare, and energy transition projects. He also approved a review of the Petroleum Industry Act (PIA) in consultation with stakeholders to address structural and fiscal anomalies.

To ensure proper implementation, a committee composed of ministers, NNPC representatives, the Budget Office, and the Nigeria

Revenue Service will oversee execution. The reforms take effect from February 13, 2026, marking a new era of accountability, efficiency, and fairness in Nigeria's oil and gas sector.

This Executive Order is more than a policy update — it's a clear signal that Nigeria's natural resources will now be managed with greater transparency, efficiency, and benefit to the people.

The Cross River State Economic Intelligence Team (CREIT) acknowledges the public statement issued by the Revenue Mobilisation Allocation and Fiscal Commission (RMAFC) concerning the report of the Inter-Agency Technical Committee (IATC) on the verification of crude oil and gas well coordinates between oil-producing states.

While we respect institutional processes, we consider it necessary, in the overriding national interest, to place the following observations, objections, and expectations on record.

1. STATUS OF THE IATC REPORT AS a PUBLIC DOCUMENTS OF NATIONAL SECURITY IMPORTANCE:

The IATC exercise was a presidentially mandated inter-agency verification mission involving statutory technical institutions and state actors. The field verification, plotting, and reconciliation of wellheads and reservoir coordinates constitute national technical intelligence with direct implications for revenue derivation, maritime boundary security, and Nigeria's offshore resource governance.

Accordingly, the IATC Report is not a routine internal memo but a public document of national security relevance. Characterising it as "speculative" or merely "draft" undermines the credibility of the inter-agency process and

weakens public confidence in transparent governance.

2. SCIENTIFIC PLOTTING AND EVIDENTIARY OUTCOMES:

The plotting of 239 crude oil and gas wellheads and coordinates on the most accurate and current scientific base maps of Nigeria, using geodetic, hydrographic, and reservoir system references, produced clear, visible, and verifiable outcomes already contained in the IATC Report.

These outcomes demonstrate reservoir continuity, spatial attribution of wellheads, and the precise location of crude and gas accumulations within the maritime territory of Cross River State. These findings are evidence-based and cannot be displaced by administrative re-characterisation or procedural delays.

3. PROTECTION OF NATIONAL MARITIME BOUNDARY SECURITY AND STRATEGIC NAVIGATION CHANNELS:

The Cross River Estuary, adjoining offshore maritime spaces, and the unceded body of water at the estuarine mouth constitute strategic national maritime corridors for navigation, maritime security operations, and continental shelf entitlements.

Any attempt to alter, dilute, or administratively manipulate the technical findings of the IATC poses grave national security risks, including the compromise of Nigeria's maritime boundary integrity, exposure of sensitive hydrographic and navigation channels, and the weakening of Nigeria's strategic posture in the Gulf of Guinea.

4. PROTECTION OF ONSHORE AND OFFSHORE WELLHEADS AND RESERVOIR COORDINATES WITHIN CROSS RIVER STATE MARITIME TERRITORY:

The onshore and offshore wellheads and reservoir systems identified within Cross River State's maritime territory are critical national assets. These include reservoirs within the Calabar Estuaries, the Calabar Geological Flank, and formations linked to the Niger Delta petroleum system. CREIT emphasises that the protection of these coordinates is not merely a revenue issue but a matter of sovereign resource security, investment certainty, and national upstream petroleum governance.

5. OBJECTION TO POST-FACTO ADMINISTRATIVE INFLUENCE BY HEAFS OF FEDERAL AGENCIES, WHO ARE NOT MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

While RMAFC, NBC, and OSGOF are statutory institutions with defined mandates, CREIT strongly objects to any attempt by the leadership of these agencies to influence, alter, dilute, or reframe the technical outcomes of the IATC after the conclusion of field verification and scientific plotting.

These agencies were represented within the IATC process. The integrity of the inter-agency framework requires that the Committee's technical findings stand on their own merit and are not subjected to post-facto administrative gatekeeping by the same institutions whose historical omissions necessitated this extraordinary inter-agency verification exercise.

6. INTERFERENCE AT THE IATC PLENARY OF 26 January 2025:

We wish to formally draw the attention of the Chairman of the Revenue Mobilisation Allocation and Fiscal Commission to the plenary session of 26 January 2025, at which a letter from the Chairman of the National Boundary Commission (NBC) was tabled, purporting to direct the Chairman of the IATC to compel the Committee to adopt a particular obsolete 2008 Oil Dichotomy Variant Map for the plotting of newly verified crude oil and gas coordinates within the Cross River State maritime territory.

The Chairman is respectfully invited to note that, on that date and in his presence, the Cross River State Economic Intelligence Team (EIT), alongside the Office of the Attorney-General of Ondo State, formally objected to this attempted interference.

These objections were supported by documentary evidence, including NBC correspondence of 2024 addressed to Cross River State and OSGOF correspondence of 2024, both of which discredited the continued use and technical validity of the 2008 map.

The subsequent attempts by the leadership of NBC and OSGOF to impose a predetermined cartographic outcome, in spite of the national maritime security implications and strategic risks involved, amount to an improper encroachment on the technical independence of the IATC.

The Chairman is accordingly urged to ensure that the Committee's scientific findings are protected from such interference and that this matter is clearly communicated to Mr President as part of the final transmission of the Report.

7. OUTSTANDING 2024 INTER-AGENCY REPORT AND THE HEIGHTENED NATIONAL SECURITY STAKES OF THE 2025 EXERCISE:

CREIT respectfully requests the Chairman of RMAFC to note that in May 2024, a similar inter-agency verification exercise reportedly recommended the attribution of 67 oil wells to Cross River State. To date, the Commission is yet to deliberate upon or transmit that report to Mr President for executive consideration.

The 2025 IATC Report, however, carries even more profound national maritime security implications for Nigeria and the Cross River Estuary than a mere question of oil well attribution. In view of the cumulative national interest involved, CREIT counts on the Chairman's understanding and leadership to ensure that both the 2024 and 2025 reports are transmitted to Mr President without further delay.

8. DUE PROCESS AND IMMEDIATE TRANSMISSION TO MR PRESIDENT:
CREIT maintains that due process, in this context, is best served by the immediate transmission of the IATC Report to Mr President, together with any minority observations or technical reservations as annexes, rather than withholding, reworking, or sanitising the core findings.

The President is constitutionally positioned to receive, evaluate, and direct further actions on matters with profound national security, fiscal federalism, and inter-state equity implications.

9. EXPECTATION OF OUTCOMES:

CREIT therefore expects that:

The IATC Report will be preserved in its original technical integrity;

The scientific plotting outcomes on the 239 verified coordinates will be upheld as the evidentiary baseline for attribution;

The national maritime security implications of the Cross River Estuary and adjoining offshore boundary spaces will be expressly recognised; and

The Report will be transmitted to Mr President without delay for executive consideration and appropriate constitutional action.

CONCLUSION:

Cross River State's position is grounded not in sentiment but in science, verified coordinates, reservoir systems, and the overriding national interest.

The credibility of Nigeria's inter-agency governance architecture depends on

protecting technical truth from administrative dilution. The IATC Report represents a rare moment of evidence-based clarity in a historically contentious domain and must be preserved and transmitted in its full technical integrity.

RE: REPORT OF THE INTER-AGENCY COMMITTEE ON THE VERIFICATION OF COORDINATES OF DISPUTED CRUDE OIL AND GAS WELLS BETWEEN OIL PRODUCING STATES

The Cross River Indigenes Development Association (CRIDA), Abuja, wishes at the outset to express profound appreciation to His Excellency, President Bola Ahmed Tinubu, for his visionary leadership and decisive initiative in approving the constitution of an Inter-Agency Technical Committee on the Verification of Coordinates of Disputed Crude Oil and Gas Wells between Oil Producing States.

This bold step demonstrates Mr. President's unwavering commitment to justice, scientific objectivity, national cohesion and the protection of Nigeria's sovereign and maritime interests, particularly around the strategic Calabar estuary. By instituting a technical and evidence-based process, the President has reinforced confidence in constitutional governance and strengthened Nigeria's capacity to assert full ownership of its maritime boundaries in accordance with law.

CRIDA also recognizes the institutional role of the Revenue Mobilisation Allocation and Fiscal Commission (RMAFC) as a participating member of the Inter-Agency Committee. However, we respectfully emphasize that RMAFC is only one of several agencies constituted under the presidential directive and does not possess overriding authority over the Technical Committee's findings.

Given that the Committee was duly constituted by Mr. President, it is our considered position that the final technical report should be transmitted directly to him as the constituting authority. Any extended scrutiny, reinterpretation or procedural delay outside the original mandate risks creating institutional overreach and undermining the scientific integrity of

the exercise.

CRIDA states unequivocally that we disagree with any delay in forwarding the Committee's findings to the President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria.

This matter transcends routine administration. It directly impacts:

- The economic survival of Cross River State
- The constitutional rights of its people
- Nigeria's maritime and territorial clarity
- Fiscal justice among oil-producing states

The verification process has been conducted. The scientific coordinate exercise has been completed. The outcome has already entered public discourse. Cross Riverians are fully aware of the implications.

While we acknowledge the need for procedural compliance, we strongly maintain that:

1. The verification exercise has been concluded on technical grounds.
2. The findings are already widely known and discussed publicly.
3. Prolonged bureaucratic handling at this stage may generate avoidable suspicion and erode public confidence.

In the spirit of national interest, transparency, and institutional integrity, CRIDA calls on the RMAFC and all committee members to:

- Immediately transmit the report and its findings to Mr. President without further delay.
- Ensure that the report is forwarded in its original, unaltered and scientifically validated form.
- Refrain from any action capable of suggesting tailoring, dilution, reinterpretation or administrative modification of the Committee's findings.

Cross Riverians will not accept any tailored outcome or administrative maneuver capable of distorting verified technical realities on ground. The sanctity of this process must be preserved.

We reiterate that transparency strengthens institutions. It reinforces public trust and affirms the credibility of Mr. President's reform-driven leadership. Any unnecessary delay in transmission may inadvertently cast doubt on an

initiative that was clearly conceived in good faith and national interest.

CRIDA therefore respectfully but firmly calls all relevant institutions to act strictly within their constitutional boundaries and adhere to truth, objectivity and procedural fidelity.

The people of Cross River State deserve justice.
Nigeria deserves transparency.
History demands accountability.



During the interactive session, some information officers shared professional experiences, contributions and offered suggestions aimed at improving productivity, teamwork and

effective information management across ministries, departments and agencies. The meeting reaffirmed the critical role of information officers in shaping public perception, safeguarding government image and ensuring accurate and timely dissemination of government policies, programmes and activities to the public.

Thus, undermining the State Bureau of Statistics Law, our commitment to producing high quality, productive and mutually acceptable data for evidence driven governance, and ultimately the socio-economic development of our dear State.

Accordingly, in order to strengthen the quality, comparability, and utility of any statistical data originating from the State, all MDAs and our development partners intending to



collaborate closely with the State Bureau of Statistics in planning, designing and implementation of their surveys and data collection activities.

Any data generated and disseminated at any level without due involvement or clearance of the State Bureau of Statistics shall not be accepted as official statistical data of Cross River State.

The Planning Commission in collaboration with the Bureau of Statistics is committed to supporting in building MDAs Institutional Capacity for data collection.

The contents of this circular should be brought to the notice of all concerned.

This circular takes immediate effect.

Thanks to Mr. President, the Federal Government Inter-Agency Technical Committee was set up to look into the emerging matters.

Comprehensive visits, mappings and findings have been made to the area in dispute by all concerned and new discoveries have emerged in the area which was not demarcated, boundaries have been set between the Cross River State estuaries and the Cameroon.

Therefore, the Committee should be allowed to present their findings to show the actual location of the Oil wells within both States. Cross River State deplores every divisive plot to disrupt the conclusion of this findings, report and implementation.

We have absolute confidence in the joint Committee and urge them to remain resolute in rewriting the wrongs of the past.

Cross River State under the Administration of Sen. Prince Bassey Otu is governed by God. What is truly ours will be returned to us.

We are hopeful of getting back all our Oil Wells.

STEPS TO OBTAIN CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY IN CROSS RIVER STATE

- 1** Obtain an Application Form at CRGIA's Office, Old Secretariat Road, Off Murtala Mohammed Highway, Calabar, Cross River State
- 2** Submit Application Form with Required Documents
Fill and submit the form along with necessary documents, e.g. Registered Title Document, survey plan, identification, etc.
- 3** Assessment and Payment of Fees.
The office will assess applicable charges, registration fees, processing fees, etc. Make the required payment.
- 4** Inspection and Publication (for private land)
Property is inspected by LUAC officials
Notice of application is published for 21 days to allow for objections.
After clearance, Governor's Approval in Principle is obtained.
- 5** C of O (Certificate of Occupancy) Engrossment and Signing
The Certificate of Occupancy is prepared (engrossed) and signed by the Governor or delegated authority.
- 6** Registration and Delivery
Final registration is completed at the Lands Registry.
Registered documents are delivered to the applicant (client).
