C'River Govt, UNICEF Launch Campaign to Promote Optimal Breastfeeding, Maternal Nutrition

The Cross River State Government, in collaboration with UNICEF and other partners, has launched Social and Behaviour Change (SBC) campaign materials aimed at promoting optimal

breastfeeding, nutrition and care for mothers and children during the first 1,000 days of life.

The campaign was flagged off in Calabar as part of activities marking the 2026 World

Breastfeeding Week, themed "Breastfeeding for a Sustainable Start in Life: Strengthening What Works."

The initiative, implemented by the Cross River State Primary



Health Care Development Agency in collaboration with UNICEF and other partners, seeks to promote positive nutrition and breastfeeding practices while encouraging families and communities to play active roles in supporting maternal and child health.

Speaking at the

event, the Director General of the Cross River State Primary Health Care Development Agency, Dr. Vivien Mesembe Otu, stressed the importance of exclusive breastfeeding to children's development and wellbeing.

She said the State Government is particularly concerned about

the first 1,000 days of a child's life and emphasized that responsibility for ensuring a healthy start should not rest on mothers alone.

According to her, husbands, traditional and religious leaders, teachers, farmers and other community members all have important roles to



play in supporting mothers and ensuring successful breastfeeding.

Also speaking, the State Coordinator of the National Primary Health Care Development Agency (NPHCDA), represented by Prof. Offiong Edem, emphasized the importance of breastfeeding in

supporting children's brain development.

In her remarks, UNICEF representative, Miss Blessing Eberechukwu, called for effective dissemination of information to ensure that accurate messages on breastfeeding, nutrition and child development reach

families and communities.

Representing the State Coordinator of the World Health Organization (WHO), Dr. Imebong said the organization remains committed to supporting Cross River State to ensure infants receive the care necessary for



healthy growth and development.

A paediatrician from the University of Calabar Teaching Hospital (UCTH), Prof. Ekanem, urged mothers to prioritize breastfeeding over bottle feeding, noting its role in

reducing the incidence of diarrhoea among children.

He called on husbands, traditional and religious leaders to support mothers and promote appropriate maternal and child health practices.

In her presentation, Dr. Winifred Ogar emphasized that breastfeeding should commence within one hour of birth and continue up to two years and beyond.

Speaking on maternal and





infant nutrition, Mrs. Edom Ekpenyong of the Nutrition Society of Nigeria urged mothers to pay greater attention to the nutritional value of their meals, noting that maternal nutrition contributes to the health and development of both mother and child.

She encouraged mothers to take supplements prescribed by health professionals, adding that breastfeeding strengthens the bond between mother and child while supporting maternal recovery.

Presenting the Social and Behaviour Change

Strategy for Nutrition Throughout the Life Cycle, Dr. Ogar called for the elimination of harmful cultural practices, gender norms and social expectations that prevent women from receiving adequate care and support.

Representing Her



Excellency, Bishop Dr. (Mrs.) Eyoanwan Bassey Otu, Lady Queeneth Essien encouraged mothers to prioritize their health throughout the first 1,000 days and urged husbands, religious and traditional

leaders to support women's health and breastfeeding.

She disclosed that the State Government will partner with the Cross River State Primary Health Care Development Agency, UNICEF and other relevant

organisations to take the SBC campaign to all 18 Local Government Areas of the state.

She underscored the importance of proper child nutrition with the message: "A well-fed child is a well-brained child."

You Must Earn Your Pay" — Cobham Reads Riot Act to Media Aides

The Cross River State Commissioner for Information and Orientation, Pastor Ekpenyong Ene Cobham, has charged information managers in the Media and Communications cluster to justify their positions by actively and consistently

publicising the achievements recorded under the administration of Governor Senator Prince Bassey Edet Otu. Speaking at a maiden cluster meeting with Media and Communications Aides to the Governor, the Commissioner said the volume of development

recorded by the Otu administration across infrastructure, education, health, agriculture and other sectors demanded a corresponding level of visibility, and that anything less amounted to a disservice to the Government and the people of Cross River

Responding, the Special Adviser on Media and Publicity and Chief Press Secretary, Mr Linus Obogo; the Special Adviser on Content Development and Archiving, Ms Beatrice Akpala; and the General

Livestock Adviser Charges Staff on Unity, Productivity to Reposition Sector

The Special Adviser to the Governor of Cross River State on Livestock, Mr. Liyel Imokehuede, has charged staff of the Ministry of Livestock, Aquaculture and Fisheries Development to embrace unity, professionalism and productivity to reposition the

ministry and maximise its potential.

Imokehuede gave the charge during a familiarisation meeting with the management and staff of the ministry, where he outlined ongoing initiatives and opportunities available to the sector under the present administration.

He expressed concern over the condition and utilisation of some government-owned livestock assets, particularly facilities that had been concessioned, stressing the need for the ministry to take greater interest in assets within its mandate and ensure they



contribute to employment, food production and economic development.

The Special Adviser also highlighted opportunities presented by the Livestock Productivity and Resilience Support Project (L-PRES), noting that Cross River State had come on board and was preparing to participate actively in the programme.

According to him,

L-PRES will provide opportunities for improved animal health services, veterinary infrastructure, abattoir development, capacity building and other interventions across the livestock value chain.

He disclosed that the state was also pursuing the development of a Livestock Integrated Hub, which would incorporate facilities such as a veterinary clinic, cold-chain infrastructure,

abattoir, training facilities and conference spaces.

Imokehuede further highlighted the potential of the honey sector, saying the ministry was exploring federal intervention and capacity-building opportunities to strengthen honey production and processing in the state.

He also announced plans for the commencement of an online enumeration and

traceability system for livestock farmers.

He explained that the first phase would involve online registration to create an updated database of livestock farmers, while the second phase would involve geo-locating farms, mapping their sizes and uploading relevant information digitally.

He said the system would provide reliable data for planning and intervention programmes while improving transparency in the distribution of government support.

The Special Adviser urged staff to take ownership

of the ministry's visibility, stressing that promoting its programmes and achievements should be a collective responsibility and not that of the Information Officer alone.

He encouraged staff to utilise their professional and social media platforms to showcase the ministry's activities and opportunities in order to attract partnerships, investments and development support.

On staff participation, Imokehuede assured workers that efforts would be made to ensure relevant personnel were carried along in programmes and capacity-building opportunities.

He also disclosed that discussions were being initiated with development organisations, including the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), on possible support for capacity building.

During the interactive session, staff members made contributions on the need to improve the ministry's working environment and strengthen its operational capacity.

Issues raised included staff welfare and training, provision of office tools, demonstration farms and ponds,

fisheries laboratory facilities, better utilisation of government assets and stronger participation of ministry personnel in development programmes.

The Head of Planning, Research and Statistics, Mr. Mitre Eyong, particularly advocated regular staff meetings to strengthen interaction and foster better understanding among employees.

He also called for the establishment of demonstration facilities where staff and students on industrial attachment could gain practical experience.

Dr. Efenji Alem Moses highlighted opportunities in

animal health, zoonotic disease prevention, international partnerships and fisheries development, while emphasising the importance of collaboration among the ministry's departments.

Responding to the contributions, Imokehuede said the administration was committed to addressing identified gaps and creating an environment where staff could contribute meaningfully to the ministry's development.

He called for stronger collaboration among the livestock, veterinary, fisheries and aquaculture departments, stressing that the various components

were interconnected and needed to work together to achieve sustainable development.

The Special Adviser said the familiarisation meeting was part of efforts to understand the ministry's challenges, communicate ongoing initiatives and mobilise staff towards a more productive and visible livestock, aquaculture and fisheries sector in Cross River State.



Ekpang Tasks C'River Town Planners on Professionalism, Due Process

The Cross River State Commissioner for Lands, Dr. Erasmus Ekpang, has charged Zonal Town Planning Officers across the 18 Local Government Areas to uphold professionalism, transparency and strict compliance with established

procedures in the discharge of their duties.

Ekpang gave the charge when the Zonal Town Planning Officers paid a courtesy visit to him in his office, marking their first official interaction with the Commissioner since his assumption of

office.

He said the meeting was aimed at strengthening collaboration between the Ministry's leadership and its zonal structures, while providing an avenue for the officers to present challenges



affecting their operations and seek administrative support where necessary.

The Commissioner stressed that effective land administration and protection could not be achieved by one person or department, urging the officers to work as a team and maintain effective

communication with the Ministry and other relevant departments.

Ekpang charged them to operate strictly within their jurisdictions and resist illegal developments, land grabbing, unauthorised occupation of property and other practices capable of undermining the state's land administration

system. He insisted that land-related disputes and grievances must be channelled through appropriate administrative and legal processes.

He also urged the officers to be proactive in identifying and reporting irregularities, while warning against



bypassing established procedures or undertaking unauthorised interventions capable of creating confusion between departments and agencies.

On revenue and financial accountability, the Commissioner directed that all government payments must be made through approved channels

and properly accounted for, warning officers against demanding or collecting money outside established government procedures.

He further called for improved coordination in the preparation and implementation of layouts, stressing that proper planning, documentation and record-keeping were essential to

preventing future disputes, encroachment and other challenges associated with poorly executed layouts.

Ekpang assured the officers that the Ministry would provide necessary administrative and institutional support whenever genuine challenges exceeded their statutory authority, but stressed that such support

would be matched by professionalism and results.

“If your work is not good, I will tell you and ask you to go back and fix it,” he said, emphasising that his commitment to defending officers would be matched by his expectation that they perform their duties properly.

The Commissioner reaffirmed his commitment to strengthening coordination between the Ministry and its zonal structures, urging the officers to remain dedicated to their duties, protect government interests and uphold a culture of openness, responsibility and adherence to due

process in land administration.

Responding, the Director of Town Planning, Mrs. Evelyn Izidor, thanked the Commissioner for the opportunity to interact with the officers and present the challenges confronting them across the state. She said the engagement provided an avenue for the officers to seek clarification and draw the Ministry’s attention to issues requiring administrative intervention.

Izidor listed the challenges to include inadequate vehicles for accessing some interior areas, security concerns during field operations, shortage of manpower and

inadequate workspace in some Local Government Areas. She appealed for the Ministry’s support in addressing the challenges to enable the officers discharge their responsibilities more effectively.

She expressed confidence that the engagement would strengthen coordination between the Ministry and its zonal structures, while enabling the officers to better understand the administration’s expectations and improve service delivery across their respective jurisdictions.

Spin Safeguards Team Strengthens Community Grievance Mechanism Ahead Of Bansara Irrigation Scheme Implementation

Ahead of the full implementation of the Bansara Irrigation Scheme, the Cross River State Safeguards

Team of the Sustainable Power and Irrigation for Nigeria (SPIN) Project has engaged community members and key

stakeholders to strengthen awareness and preparedness for the Project's Grievance Redress Mechanism (GRM).



The engagement, led by the State Project Coordinator, Engr. Mrs. Justina John Ulafor, brought together representatives of the Water Users Association (WUA), traditional and community leaders, women and youth groups, vulnerable

persons, and other stakeholders within the project area.

The engagement forms part of the SPIN Project's safeguards approach to ensuring that communities have access to transparent, inclusive, and responsive channels through which

concerns and complaints relating to project activities can be raised and addressed.

In her opening remarks, Engr. Ulafor expressed appreciation to the community for its continued cooperation and support for the project. She emphasised the



importance of an effective grievance redress system in maintaining trust between the project and host communities, particularly as activities progress from the preparation stage to implementation.

She encouraged community members to raise

concerns promptly through the established channels, stressing the need for grievances to be handled fairly, transparently, and within reasonable timeframes.

A major outcome of the engagement was the constitution and inauguration of the Bansara Grievance Redress

Committee. The committee was structured to reflect the diversity of the community, with representation from community leadership, women, youth, the Water Users Association, and vulnerable groups.

The Project's Grievance Redress



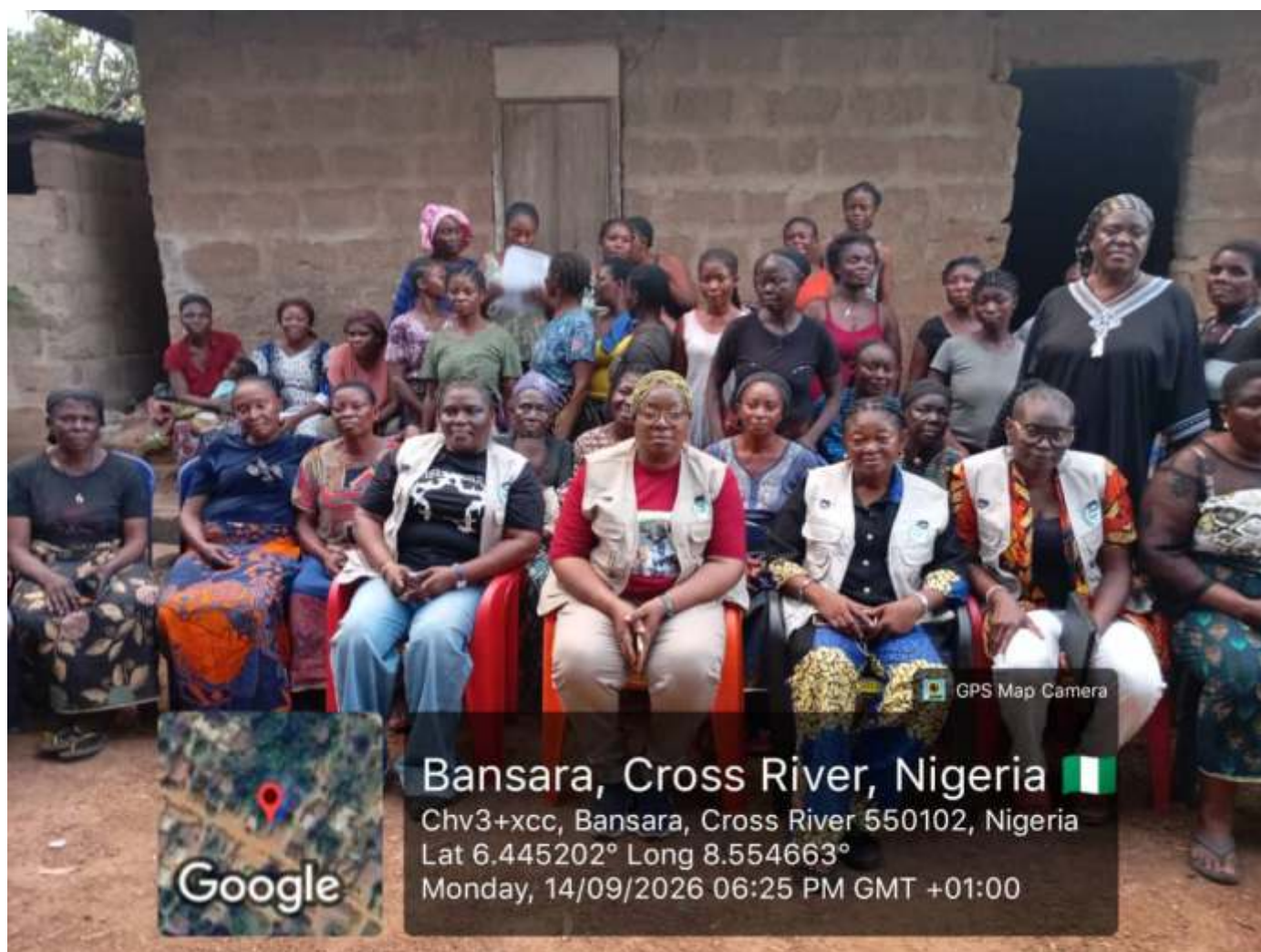
Focal Person, Mr. Paul Momnang, was also inaugurated to serve as a direct link between community members and the project's grievance management structure.

While charging the committee members and focal person on their responsibilities, the

State Project Coordinator urged them to uphold fairness, confidentiality, accountability, and inclusiveness in handling complaints. She particularly emphasised the importance of ensuring that women, vulnerable persons, and other groups who may face barriers to

participation can access the grievance mechanism without discrimination.

The inauguration was followed by a practical capacity-building session on the Grievance Redress Mechanism, facilitated by officers from the SPIN Safeguards



Team. The session was led by Mrs. Patience Mom, Social Safeguards Officer; Mrs. Theresa Abua, Environmental Safeguards Officer; and Mrs. Asi James, Gender Officer.

The training focused on the purpose and guiding principles

of the Grievance Redress Mechanism, identification and reporting of grievances, documentation and tracking procedures, resolution and referral processes, escalation pathways, confidentiality, stakeholder responsibilities and inclusive grievance management.

Participants actively engaged with the facilitators, seeking clarification on the appropriate procedures for reporting, documenting, referring and resolving different categories of grievances, as well as the roles and responsibilities of relevant



stakeholders in ensuring that complaints are addressed in a fair, transparent and timely manner.

The interactive sessions also provided an opportunity for community representatives to gain a better understanding of their roles in

promoting peaceful, transparent, and accountable project implementation.

Responding on behalf of the community, the newly inaugurated Grievance Redress Focal Person, Mr. Paul Momnang, expressed appreciation to the SPIN team for the engagement and

training.

He stated that the community welcomed the initiative and pledged to work with the committee and other stakeholders to ensure that the grievance redress structure functions effectively.

The engagement



and training underscore the SPIN Project's commitment to meaningful stakeholder participation and the integration of social, environmental, and gender safeguards into project implementation. By establishing community-level grievance redress

structures before major project activities commence, the project is strengthening the systems required to ensure that community concerns are heard, documented, and appropriately addressed throughout the implementation of the Bansara Irrigation Scheme.

The initiative represents an important step towards fostering community trust, promoting accountability, and supporting the sustainable implementation of the SPIN project in Cross River State.



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C'River Govt Reaffirms Ownership of Ogoja College of Nursing Sciences

The Cross River State Government has reaffirmed its ownership and administrative authority over the College of Nursing Sciences, Ogoja, declaring that the institution remains wholly owned and operated by the

state.

The Commissioner for Health, Dr. Henry Egbe Ayuk, PhD, stated this on Tuesday, September 22, 2026, at the Ministry of Health Headquarters, Calabar, when he received the Chairman and

members of the Governing Council of the college to review ongoing institutional and administrative matters.

Ayuk said the government's position on the ownership and administration of



its medical training institutions was clear, stressing that institutions could only operate with formal recognition and approval from the government.

"That school is owned totally by the government. The position of government is clear: the policy across the entire country is that you cannot establish a school without formal recognition and approval by

the government," the Commissioner said.

He, however, said the government was not opposed to private-sector participation in its investments, but stressed that such participation must respect the government's ownership, regulatory and administrative authority over state institutions.

"We are not afraid of the participation of the private sector

in all our investments, but it is important that they realize that fact," Ayuk added.

The meeting followed a courtesy visit by the leadership of the college's Governing Council, which sought clarification and direction from the Ministry over emerging administrative issues concerning the institution.

The Chairman of



the Governing Council, Dr. Mrs. Teresa A. Osaji, said the council considered it necessary to engage the Ministry following correspondence from the Catholic Diocese expressing an intention to assume control of the institution.

“We decided to come and see the Commissioner because of the issue bothering us in the college regarding

correspondence from the Catholic Diocese expressing an intent to assume control of the institution,” Osaji said.

She explained that, as public servants, the council members considered it important to verify their administrative standing with the state government, which owns and operates the college, and determine the appropriate way forward.

The meeting also had in attendance the Provost of the college, Dr. Fuyiko Oking; Chairman of the Cross River State Branch of the National Association of Nigerian Nurses and Midwives (NANNM), Mrs. Josephine Bassey; and governing council members Prof. Idang N. Idang, Dr. Rex U. Obo and Simon Eje Bisong.

CROSS RIVER COMMENCES STATEWIDE DISTRIBUTION OF IMPROVED COWPEA SEEDS

The Cross River State Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation Development will commence the statewide distribution of improved SAMPEA 20-T PBR cowpea seeds, developed by the Institute for Agricultural Research (IAR), to interested farmers from Monday, September 21, 2026.

SAMPEA 20-T is an improved cowpea variety developed through agricultural research, with high genetic purity and resistance to the major pod-borer pest, *Maruca vitrata*. The variety is known for early maturity, improved yield performance and reduced dependence on insecticide applications compared with susceptible conventional varieties.

The intervention is aimed at increasing cowpea production, strengthening food security and improving access to nutritious food, particularly for women and children, while enhancing farmers' productivity and livelihoods.

Distribution will be carried out in collaboration with the State Chapters of the Cowpea Farmers Association and Women in Agriculture (WIA).

Interested farmers are required to proceed to their respective Local Government Councils for documentation and collection of the improved seeds.

Farmers are advised to adhere strictly to the designated collection arrangements. The seeds are solely for planting purposes and are not for human consumption.

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Ayuk Demands Higher Standards in C'River Mortuary Management

The Cross River State Commissioner for Health, Elder Dr Henry Egbe Ayuk, has demanded higher professional standards in the management of government-owned mortuaries across the state,

stressing the need for proper care and handling of the dead.

Ayuk made the call on Tuesday, September 22, 2026, during a stakeholder meeting with managers of government-owned mortuaries and

health facilities in Calabar, where issues concerning the administration and management of mortuary services were reviewed.

He said the state government remained committed to



improving healthcare delivery and strengthening systems that promote effective service delivery, proper supervision and adherence to established health and safety standards.

The Commissioner urged managers to ensure that mortuary operations complied with approved procedures, noting

that lapses in the handling and preservation of corpses could expose workers, relatives and members of the public to avoidable health and environmental risks.

"We want to appreciate you for what we are working together to achieve: quality healthcare. You know the dead have to be taken care of very well, not only

the people who are alive, even the dead, the corpses, if we are not taking good care of it, we also are running a risk," Ayuk said.

He stressed that proper mortuary management should cover every stage of the process, from admission and preservation of corpses to their eventual release for burial, while ensuring

compliance with relevant health, safety and administrative requirements.

Ayuk also directed managers to submit updated administrative reports and records on the operational status of their facilities to strengthen monitoring, accountability and effective oversight of mortuary services across the state.

The Director of Medical and Dental Services in the Ministry of Health, Dr Stephen Agbor, called for strict compliance with the terms governing the use and management of government-owned facilities, including adherence to contractual

agreements and financial obligations.

“It is incumbent on us to know that most of these are contracts. The government has the right to withdraw all the MoUs when you are failing in your part. You have to pay those remittances, no matter how small, to government. But many people are not doing it, and it has become worrisome,” Agbor said.

He urged managers to take their contractual responsibilities seriously, particularly the regular remittance of agreed revenues to government, noting that compliance with such obligations remained part of the conditions for continued

operation.

The meeting also reviewed administrative updates and reports from government health facilities and mortuaries in General Hospital Ogoja, Ugep, Calabar, Akamkpa and Joint Hospital, Ikom.

The session was attended by the Ministry’s Procurement Officer, Mrs Ajie Achu, alongside other stakeholders, who reviewed operational concerns and considered measures to improve compliance, accountability and professional standards in the management of mortuary services.

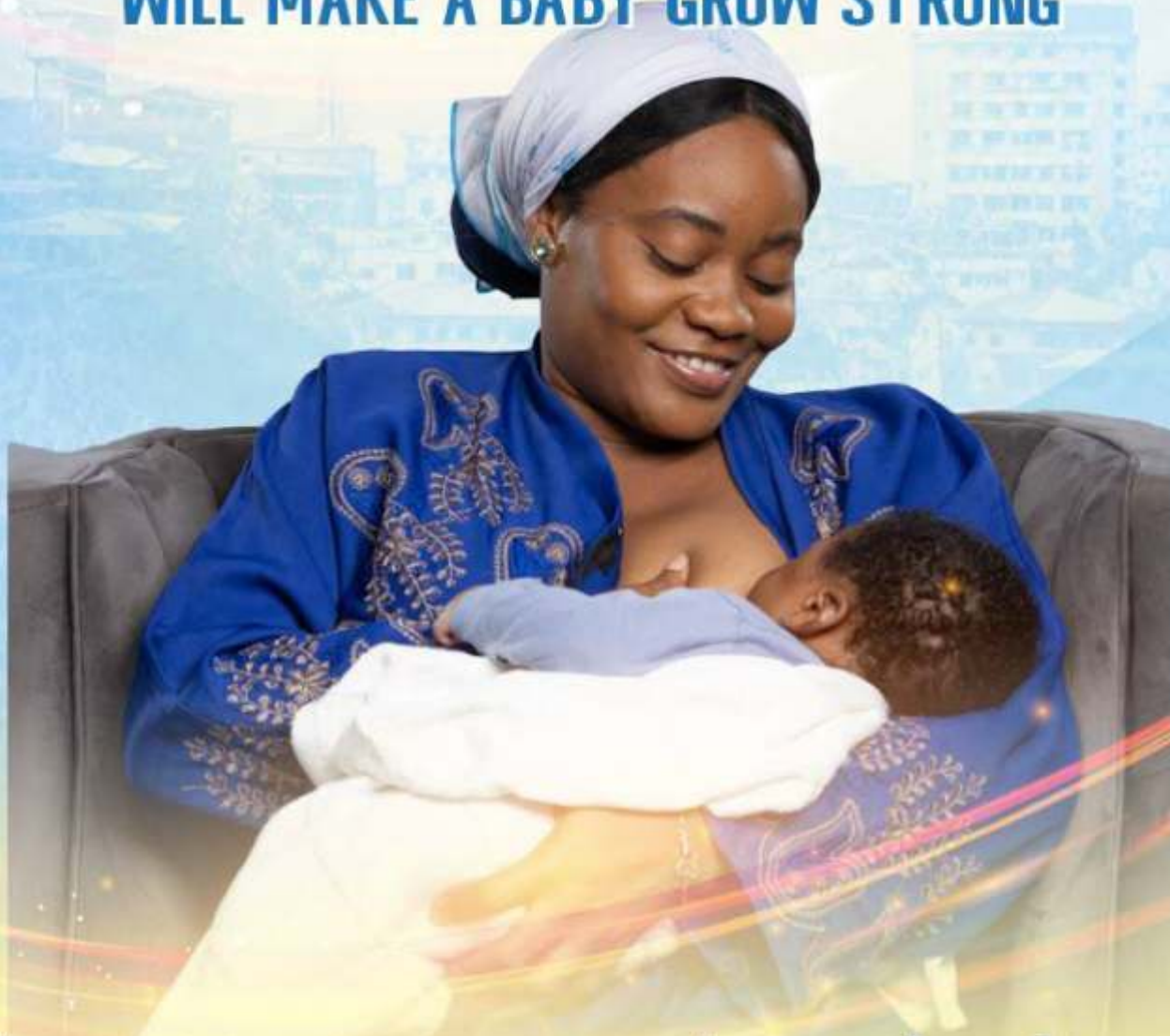

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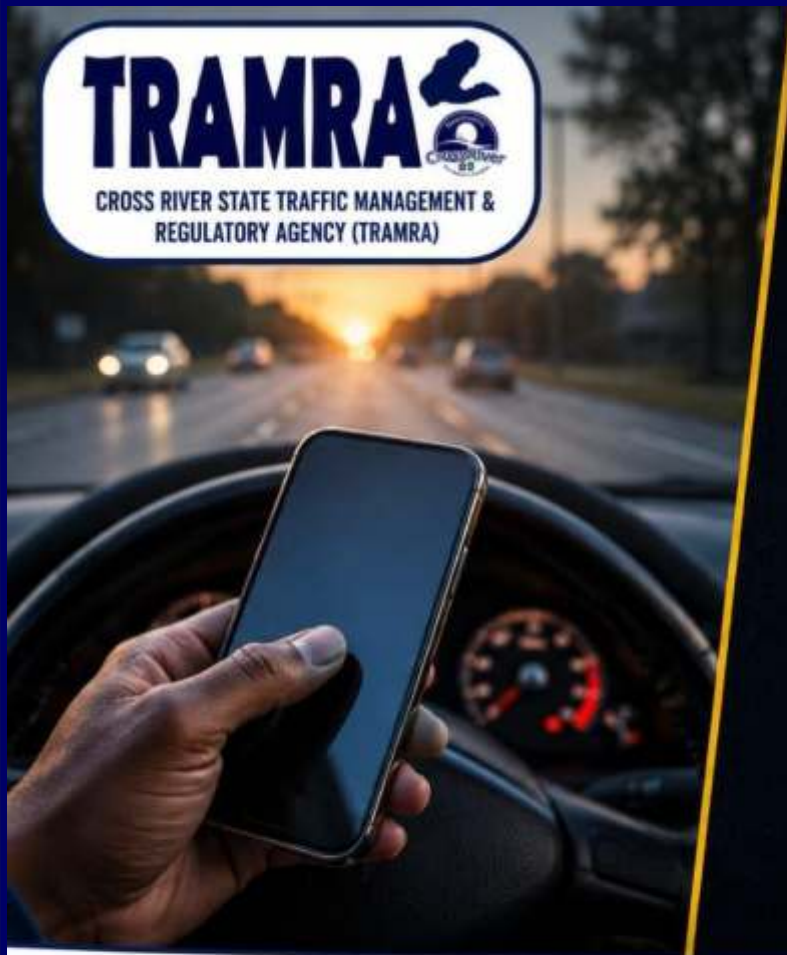

EXTENSION OF THE SUSPENSION OF ALL SCRAP-RELATED ACTIVITIES IN CROSS RIVER STATE

Further to the Press Release dated the 23rd of February 2026, communicating His Excellency, Senator Prince Bassey Edet Otu's approval of the suspension of all scrap-related activities, the Cross River State Government hereby notifies the general public that the suspension has been extended for a further period of one (1) month expiring on the 23rd August 2026.

As stated in the previous Press Release, the suspension was necessitated by the increasing incidents of vandalism, theft and destruction of public infrastructure by scavengers, scrap dealers and their agents, and the significant security threat posed to the State. This extension is intended to enable Government conclude the ongoing review of the laws, policies and regulatory framework governing scrap-related activities in Cross River State. The objective is to strengthen the regulatory regime, identify and protect legitimate operators, and implement measures that effectively prevent the infiltration of criminal elements into the sector.

Government regrets any inconvenience caused to legitimate businesses and law-abiding operators. However, the protection of public infrastructure, the preservation of public order and security remain paramount. Members of the general public are accordingly informed that the suspension remains in full force and that any person or organization found engaging in scrap-related activities in contravention of this directive shall be dealt with strictly in accordance with the law.

Gov. Otu: Repositioning Cross River's Information Sector for Transparency, Digital Governance, Global Visibility

Information is the lifeblood of governance. It shapes public perception, inspires confidence, preserves history and connects government with the governed. Recognising this reality, Governor Bassey

Edet Otu made the revitalisation of Cross River State's information ecosystem a strategic component of his People First Agenda, transforming what had long been regarded as a routine government communication apparatus



into a dynamic instrument for transparency, citizen engagement and institutional efficiency.

Three years into the administration, the information sector has emerged as one of the state's most improved sectors, recording remarkable progress in digital transformation, public communication, media relations, broadcasting, institutional strengthening and archival documentation. The reforms implemented between 2023 and 2026 have not only modernised government information management but have also significantly enhanced Cross River

State's visibility on the national and international stage.

Prior to 2023, many of the structures responsible for government information management had suffered years of neglect. Critical communication infrastructure was outdated, public engagement had diminished, digital platforms were inactive, and the Ministry of Information operated with severe manpower and technological limitations.

Governor Otu's administration responded with deliberate investments





aimed at rebuilding the Ministry into a modern public communication institution capable of meeting the demands of contemporary governance.

For the first time in well over a decade, the Ministry underwent comprehensive institutional revitalisation. Modern ICT equipment was procured, digital workflows introduced, and office operations significantly improved through technology-driven systems. Equally significant was the recruitment of 20 new personnel (information officers), ending a manpower deficit that had persisted for more than 13 years and injecting fresh capacity into government information management.

These reforms improved operational efficiency while

laying the foundation for a more responsive and professional information service.

Perhaps one of the administration's most visible achievements has been the deliberate repositioning of Cross River State within the national media landscape.

Under Governor Otu, the Commissioner for



Information maintained consistent appearances on leading national television networks including Channels Television, AIT, ARISE News, TVC, NTA and other major platforms. These engagements provided opportunities to explain government policies, address public concerns, counter misinformation and showcase development initiatives across multiple sectors.

According to official records, Cross River's national media visibility rose dramatically from approximately 28 percent in 2022 to about 78 percent by 2025, representing one of the most

significant improvements in government media presence in recent years.

Beyond publicity, the initiative strengthened transparency, improved policy communication and restored public confidence in government information.

One of the landmark achievements of the administration was the revival of the Ministry of Information's official website, www.moi.cr.gov.ng, which had remained inactive since 2015.

The restoration of the website was



accompanied by the establishment of official social media platforms on Facebook, Instagram and X (formerly Twitter), creating an integrated digital communication ecosystem capable of reaching citizens both within Nigeria and across the diaspora.

These platforms now provide timely updates on government activities, policy decisions, public announcements and developmental projects, ensuring that citizens receive information directly from official sources.

Government estimates indicate that the

digital platforms currently account for approximately 70 percent of the Ministry's publicity reach, with a target of increasing coverage to 95 percent by 2027 through full integration with the state's official digital platforms.

The daily publication and electronic distribution of government news bulletins to Ministries, Departments and Agencies have further strengthened real-time information dissemination and inter-agency communication.

One of the less publicised but highly significant reforms has been the



restoration of official government documentation.

For years, several statutory government publications had suffered irregular production, affecting record keeping and legal documentation.

The Otu administration reversed this trend through the commercial printing and publication of Government Gazettes, White Papers, Tender Journals and all enacted state laws, including the 2025 Appropriation Law.

These publications have strengthened

institutional memory, improved legal documentation, enhanced transparency and preserved important government decisions for future generations.

Similarly, the resumption and sustained production of official government bulletins since January 2023 has restored a vital information channel that had previously become inactive.

Another landmark achievement has been the revival of Giant Strides Magazine, the Ministry's flagship publication showcasing government projects, programmes and development



initiatives.

The magazine, which had not been published since July 2017, resumed publication in October 2023 and has remained consistent.

Within three years, seven editions have been completed, and more than 13,000 copies have been distributed across Nigeria.

Beyond public enlightenment, the publication now serves as an enduring documentary record of the Otu administration's developmental journey and a valuable archival resource for future generations.

Governor Otu's administration also demonstrated an appreciation for strategic storytelling as a tool for investment promotion and image building.

The production and nationwide broadcast of the documentary "Governor Otu @2" represented a significant milestone in government communication.

Aired on Channels Television, AIT, ARISE News, TVC, NTA and other national networks between May and June 2025, the documentary highlighted achievements across multiple sectors, projecting Cross River State to a nationwide audience and strengthening

investor confidence in the state's development agenda.

Combined with regular press briefings and sustained media engagements, these initiatives have ensured that government activities remain accessible, verifiable and visible.

While embracing digital communication, the administration equally recognised the importance of grassroots engagement.

Through sustained mass mobilisation campaigns, coordinated press releases, Information Officers deployed across Ministries, Departments and Agencies, and the Village Square Broadcast Programme, government information

reached communities that traditionally had limited access to digital media.

The Village Square initiative particularly strengthened communication with traditional institutions, promoted indigenous values and ensured that government policies were explained in culturally relevant ways.

This combination of digital innovation and community engagement has significantly expanded the reach of government communication across urban and rural communities alike.

CRBC's Digital Revolution

If the Ministry of Information experienced institutional renewal, the





Cross River Broadcasting Corporation underwent a complete technological transformation.

Over the last three years, CRBC evolved from a conventional broadcasting station into a modern multimedia organisation.

The Corporation introduced a fully paperless digital newsroom, enabling

real-time news production and significantly improving operational efficiency.

To guarantee uninterrupted broadcasting despite Nigeria's persistent power challenges, four television and radio studios were equipped with inverter systems, virtually eliminating on-air interruptions caused by electricity



outages.

Additional investments included the installation of a new 20/2-kilowatt radio transmitter, a 13KVA electrical substation, comprehensive remodelling of radio studios, reception areas, conference facilities and newsroom infrastructure, as well as the acquisition of a new operational vehicle.

These improvements have substantially enhanced staff productivity and broadcast quality.

Perhaps the most transformative

achievement at CRBC has been the expansion of its audience beyond traditional terrestrial broadcasting.

Television services were migrated to satellite and Free-to-Air platforms, while Radio Garden integration enabled global online radio streaming.

The launch of the Naija TV mobile application, migration to the GOtv platform and government-supported NIGOSAT carriage services further expanded access to Cross River programming.

Today, CRBC reaches audiences across more



than ten local government areas while simultaneously serving viewers and listeners across Nigeria and the international diaspora.

For the first time, Cross River's stories are being told simultaneously to local communities and global audiences.

Understanding the changing media landscape, has CRBC established a modern podcast studio through collaboration with diaspora media partners in the United States.

This initiative has opened new opportunities for digital content production while positioning the Corporation to compete within today's evolving multimedia environment.

Equally important was the expansion of indigenous language programming following the acquisition of National Broadcasting Commission thematic language licences.

Combined with tourism-focused programmes, these initiatives have strengthened cultural preservation while

promoting Cross River's rich heritage to wider audiences.

Strengthening Institutional Capacity

Beyond infrastructure and technology, the administration has invested heavily in institutional development.

Participation in national fora of Information Commissioners under the Progressive Governors' Forum has enhanced intergovernmental collaboration while improving policy coordination and professional networking.

The remarkable transformation recorded in the information sector has also attracted national recognition for the Honourable Commissioner for Information, Dr. Erasmus Ekpang, whose leadership has earned him several prestigious media and public communication awards from reputable professional bodies and organizations across the country. In further affirmation of Cross River State's growing influence in public communication, the Commissioner was unanimously elected Secretary of the Forum of Commissioners for Information in All Progressives Congress (APC)-governed states, a development widely regarded as a testament to the administration's innovative communication strategy, institutional reforms and outstanding

contributions to information management at both the state and national levels.

Coverage of major state ceremonies, including Democracy Day, Independence Day, Children's Day and anniversary celebrations of the People First Administration, has ensured that important moments in the state's history are professionally documented and preserved.

Meanwhile, the continued publication of over 173 editions of the Nigerian Chronicle and Weekend Chronicle has sustained the state's print media presence and enriched the historical archive of government activities.

Another significant milestone has been the near-completion of the comprehensive restoration of the Cross River State Newspaper Corporation complex, which was extensively vandalised and destroyed during the #EndSARS protests in 2020.

The rehabilitation of the corporation's facilities represents the administration's commitment to rebuilding critical public institutions and restoring the state's capacity for public information dissemination through its flagship newspapers.

In furtherance of this objective, the Otu administration has also procured modern digital printing equipment for the restoration of the Government Printing Press. When fully operational, the facility

will not only guarantee greater confidentiality in the printing of sensitive government documents, gazettes, white papers and other official publications, but will also position the state to generate additional revenue through commercial printing services for public and private organisations.

These complementary investments underscore Governor Otu's broader vision of rebuilding the entire government information value chain, from content creation and documentation to printing, publishing and distribution, while strengthening institutional self-reliance, improving operational efficiency and creating new economic opportunities within the information sector.

Ultimately, the achievements recorded in the information sector extend far beyond improved publicity.

They represent the deliberate construction of an open, digitally connected and citizen-focused governance system.

Through stronger communication channels, modern broadcasting infrastructure, revitalised institutional capacity, enhanced digital engagement, improved archival systems and broader media visibility, Governor Bassey Otu has repositioned information as a strategic instrument for development rather than merely a vehicle for publicity.

The reforms have strengthened transparency, increased citizen participation, expanded access to government information and restored confidence in public communication.

Three years after assuming office, Governor Bassey Edet Otu has transformed Cross River's information sector from a largely analogue, under-resourced system into a modern, technology-driven communication ecosystem.

From reviving dormant digital platforms and modernising government documentation to repositioning CRBC for global broadcasting and restoring Cross River's voice on the national media stage, the administration has demonstrated that effective governance depends as much on how government communicates as on what it delivers.

As the state advances toward deeper digital governance, broader citizen engagement and stronger institutional transparency, the reforms implemented between 2023 and 2026 have laid a durable foundation for an information sector that is not only more efficient and innovative but also better equipped to serve the people of Cross River State in the years ahead.

STEPS TO OBTAIN CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY IN CROSS RIVER STATE

- 1** Obtain an Application Form at CRGIA's Office, Old Secretariat Road, Off Murtala Mohammed Highway, Calabar, Cross River State
- 2** Submit Application Form with Required Documents
Fill and submit the form along with necessary documents, e.g. Registered Title Document, survey plan, identification, etc.
- 3** Assessment and Payment of Fees.
The office will assess applicable charges, registration fees, processing fees, etc. Make the required payment.
- 4** Inspection and Publication (for private land)
Property is inspected by LUAC officials
Notice of application is published for 21 days to allow for objections.
After clearance, Governor's Approval in Principle is obtained.
- 5** C of O (Certificate of Occupancy) Engrossment and Signing
The Certificate of Occupancy is prepared (engrossed) and signed by the Governor or delegated authority.
- 6** Registration and Delivery
Final registration is completed at the Lands Registry.
